7 Disclaimer:

A player must be a relatively high round player to be considered for 7 bust grade. Fringe players rated 6 are considered cheap, therefore not hugely disappointing if they don't work out. So in a backhanded way, it is a compliment to be predicted as a bust, because that player will likely get drafted high and will at least get a nice rookie deal. A bust must have high expectations and by implication a high salary.
